Leaky loos: Frequently asked questions



Did you know?

Between 5% and 8% of toilets are leaking and each one can waste between 215 and 400 litres of clean drinking water on average every day. Fixing leaky loos could save you as much as £300 per year. It could also contribute around 10% of the additional water capacity needed to cope with an extreme drought in England by 2050.

How can I tell if my toilet is leaking?

Look out for these signs:

- The sound of a constant trickle at the back of the toilet pan is an obvious sign that something's not right
- Noise in the cistern, even when the toilet hasn't been flushed
- You notice your water meter usage rising

Is there a way I can check if I have a leaky loo?

There is a simple test you can do:

- **Step 1:** Half an hour after a flush, wipe the back of the pan dry with toilet tissue
- Step 2: Place a new, dry sheet of toilet tissue across the back of the pan
- **Step 3:** Leave it in place for up to three hours without using the toilet, or overnight
- **Step 4:** If the paper is wet or torn in the morning you have a leaky loo
